On Thursday, June 13, the only Canadian basketball team in the NBA became the 2019 champions.

The Toronto Raptors won the series 4-2 in its first trip to the finals in the team's 24-year-history.

Pokémon Go Resurges in Popularity

Gifties are spending quite a bit of their free time playing Pokémon Go since people found out that the Collette dorm has a Pokémon Go gym.

Some Gifties, like freshman Katherine Leslie, said the game is "so 2016." Others, however, said they enjoy playing the game, which uses real locations to let players capture virtual creatures, called Pokémon, in real locations.

"It's starting to come back, and that's a good thing because other people are playing with you," freshman Lee Johnson said.

Much of the play centers around the Pokémon Go gym at the dorm and around the occasional raids at the gym site in the game. Raids, cooperative battles in which groups of players work together to defeat raid bosses, were launched in 2017 as part of a game update. During a raid, the powerful boss spawns at a gym, and players have a set amount of time to defeat it. If they're successful, they get in-game items and rewards.

The game also uses cell phone step counters to hatch eggs, and some Gifties are taking their phones with them to class so they can get their kilometers in to hatch their Pokémon eggs. Even counselors are in on the

game, with occasional Remind messages ending in #TeamValor, one of the three Pokémon Go teams.

During the summer of 2016, an article in The Thinker described the launch of the augmented reality game and included a number of Gifties who played. Several counselors were students in the program at the time, and they participate when they can.

"It's really old and it's coming back," said freshman Alex Fontenot.

Parent company Niantic was once part of Google and used the company's map technology to build its virtual world on the real one. People take pictures of all kinds of places and upload them to Google images. Niantic used Google Maps technology and pictures from Google Images to create the Pokémon Go map, Pokestops, and gyms, according to Games-Radar.

After the record-breaking 2016 launch, U.S. users dropped to about 5 million, according to tech website BusinessofApps.com. People stopped playing Pokémon Go in 2016 because at that time, there were only 150 Pokémon, and eventually people got tired of catching the same thing over and over again.

But then Pokémon Go creator Niantic updated the game and added new region Pokémon, like the Johto

Region and the Kalos Region. That got people back into the game with a new motivation to catch newer Pokémon.

The game has a somewhat checkered history, cited as contributing to accidents and a few fatalities as players paid more attention to the virtual world than the real one.

However, the game has earned a total of \$2.2 billion in revenue since its launch in 2016, according to market intelligence company Sensor Tower. It remains in the top five mobile gaming apps in the United States.

"It's pretty cool," freshman Maddi Smith said.


Theft Issue in Girl's Dorm

Interview with Director Josh Brown

Why did you decide to attend GPGC?


"My parents sent me here when I was 12 years old. At that time, the walls in the lobby were a really dark brown color. Not only that, but when I went here, Collette (the girls' dorm at the time) was the nicest dorm."

How was GPGC founded?

"When GPGC was founded, it was actually called the McNeese Summer Enrichment Program, or SEP. Back then, GPGC was just a day program where you took academic classes and then you went home. There was no staying the night, or having movie nights and other activities."

How long did you go to GPGC?

"I went to the program for five summers total. This was between 1983 and 1987. I really enjoyed the experience. I feel like it truly got you to be with other kids with similar capabilities as you. You can have kids to talk about the same thing you do without being confused or not understanding."



Would you change anything in the program?

"I would say I want to have a better recruiting job. I feel like the kids in Louisiana don't know what they're missing out on. I want kids from all over the state to enjoy the experience GPGC has to offer to them. I understand that we've had lots of kids joining, but I feel like there should be a bigger population. Maybe have more kids from the north part of the state."

How long have you been director?

Drone Delivery is Now a Reality



Delivery has gone from snail mail, to email, to UPS, to drones. Amazon, Google, and UberEats have announced plans for drones to deliver packages under five pounds over the next few months.

Amazon's drone uses thermal cameras, depth cameras and sonar to detect hazards. Onboard computers detect objects and navigate around them. The drone's rotors are fully covered for safety and serve as wings during suspended flight. This drone can fly up to 15 miles, carry packages up to five pounds and deliver packages to a customer in under 30 minutes.

UberEats has decided to test its food drone delivery in San Diego, California. The difference between this process and Amazon's delivery service is that UberEats combines drones with car delivery to shorten time. UberEats has also tested its drones using Mcdonalds ice cream, fries, and burgers. Average ground transportation for 1.5 miles would last 21 minutes, but with flying drones it would take seven minutes.

Finally, Google has come up with the idea to use 'Wing'. This drone can fly up to 120 miles per hour and is powered by electricity. It also includes a safety feature which allows it to find a safe and convenient way to navigate around things like trees, power lines, and buildings. It

makes food, medical supplies, and home deliveries.

All of these companies said they are working to create drones that produce smaller amounts of greenhouse gases, make delivery faster, and make transportation of packages safer.



Sign-Out Spots Include Local Businesses

With certain permission and following sign-out rules, Gifties are allowed to go to several places any day of the week or weekend. Some places may require a second-year student and others will require a third-year student, a counselor or special permission.

Some of the sign-out locations and important information are listed here

The McNeese State University Library in Frazar Hall is open on weekdays from 7:30 a.m. - 9 p.m. They have copy machines available for use. You need 10 cents for each copy you make. There are four floors in the

library and a wide selection of books and information. If you ever have a question or concern, you can call the library at (337) 475-5725. This location requires a second-year student.

Starbucks on the McNeese campus includes a selection of Starbucks drinks and pastries. There are two locations on campus. One location is in the library and the other is in the Old Ranch across from the cafeteria. This location requires a third-year student.

GPGC students are also allowed to go to McDonald's. It is open all day, every day. This summer, McDonald's is doing an event where they feature new items on their menu inspired from places around the world. This location requires a second year. Students may also go to Subway. Restaurant hours are from 9 a.m. - 11 p.m. every day. Subway offers many healthy choices. It's easy to stay on GPGC budget at this restaurant.

Paper Heroes is a comic book and game store that GPGC students may go to (with special permission from the coordinator of housing) to buy comic books, action figures, posters, sports cards, D&D games, sports figurines, DC comics, and Marvel comics. It is open from 10 a.m. - 7 p.m. weekdays and from 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. on Saturday. The store is closed on Sundays. This location requires special permission and a counselor.
