New Law Calls for Fewer Food Additives

School meals and snacks will look different in Louisiana starting in the 2027-28 school year after a new Louisiana law prohibited a list of additives in some snacks and breakfast and lunch foods.

Snacks like chewing gum and AirHeads, and breakfast and lunch foods including Froot Loops, yellow cake mix, butter and French bread fall under the list of foods prohibited in public schools under Louisiana Senate Bill 14, which passed June 8.

The bill prohibits certain ingredients from being served to students during breakfast

and lunch during school hours and during before- or aftercare services. The law does not address foods sold in vending machines or at concession stands.

The bill also includes a provision for physicians to complete continuing education on nutrition, for schools to purchase food produced within the state and for food produced with seed oils to be labeled as such.

Louisiana's actions followed an April 30 executive order from Gov. Jeff Landry that urged the state's Department of Children and Family Services to remove soft drinks and candy from SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) benefits and incentivize the purchase of fruits and vegetables using SNAP benefits.

Landry's order came just after President Donald Trump signed a Feb. 13 executive order as part of a "Make America Healthy Again" initiative.

According to the Center for Science in the Public Interest, a food safety and nutrition advocacy organization, the additives included in the legislation pose significant health risks to the consumer, including but not limited to gastrointestinal issues, increased cancer risk, and genetic damage.



Dinosaur of the Week

Cretoxyrhina Mantelli

This prehistoric mackerel shark existed from 107 to 73 million years ago and is more commonly referred to as the Ginsu shark because its feeding mechanism is compared to the "slicing and dicing" of Ginsu knives.

According to articles published by the Kansas Academy of Science and the Public Library of Science journal, the shark was among the fastest sharks to ever exist, with calculations suggesting it swam at about 12 km per hour with burst speeds up to 70 km per hour. For comparison, modern-day great whites have been modeled at speeds up to 56 km per hour. The fastest modern shark, the shortfin make shark, has been modeled at speeds up to 70 km per hour.

Cretoxyrhina mantelli was found in sup-tropical to tropical oceans, including the Western Interior Seaway, an inland sea that split the U.S. in half. Fossils have also been found in modern-day Europe, Israel and Kazakhstan.

Fossilized stomach content of the Ginsu shark suggests it ate many of the marine megafauna



found in the areas where it lived, and there has even been a fossil of a pteranodon (a flying dinosaur) with Cretoxyrhina teeth found in its vertebrae.

It's likely the shark was very similar in size to modern-day great white sharks, according to a 2009 article in the Journal of Paleontology. Scientists speculate the shark probably shared a hunting style with today's great white sharks, ramming into prey at high speeds and killing it with one blow or maybe scavenging.

The two are distantly related, but great whites evolved later on in history, managing to avoid the extinction events that Cretoxyrhina, and the rest of its evolutionary tree, could not.

he's on Project Hail Mary.


